Another opportunity the Community Relations offers is the annual Clonard get-together held in the Clonard school grounds early each year. On this occasion we welcome different groups of Old Collegians back to the school to meet up and see the school as it is today. The get-together offers the chance for students to gather together with their classmates 10 years, 20 years, 30 years, 40 years and 50 years after graduation. It is timely to remember that the first group of students started at Clonard more than 55 years ago in 1956.

At this event you can expect to see a large selection of old uniforms, photos, memorabilia, *Reflections* school magazines along with some of the current school leaders who take the old collegians on a tour of the school, taking in the existing buildings and the new and innovative developments throughout the school. As you could imagine, there is a lot of loud and boisterous laughter and discussion when you have the opportunity to bring together groups of ladies who have not seen each other or the school in many years. The afternoon of activities also provides Old Collegians with an opportunity to meet the new Principal and some staff members.

The Community Relations committee is also very committed to inviting Old Collegians to come back to the school and reflect on their time at Clonard, providing insight and direction to our current group of students, for instance to support Community Service or as guest speakers for careers. Clonard has now grown to approximately 800 students, over 60 teaching staff and facilities that support a wide and diverse selection of subjects and extra-curricular activities. This involvement of Old-Collegians extends to the actual Community Relations Committee which is made up of former Clonard students and in one case a mother of a former student. ## Mock Court

Clonard entered a team in this year's inter-school Mock Court Competition, sponsored by the Geelong Law Association, which runs in courtrooms in the Geelong Magistrates' Court and was successful in Round 1 on Tuesday 23rd August.

Clonard's team comprised Year 11 Legal Studies students Michaela Buckle (the accused), Tayla Hegyesi (her helpful witness), Sarah Roberts and Josephine Mirachi (Barristers) and Adele Chenoweth (Solicitor), with support from Maddison Howie (team photographer). It was rewarding to see former student Tash Gillett (Year 12 2010) behind the counter at the Court in her position as Court Administration trainee.

The accused faced three charges including driving whilst disqualified and failure to produce identification to police. After legal holes were blown through the prosecution case, in both cross-examination and in defence submissions, by the combined legal minds of Sarah Roberts, Josephine Mirachi and Adele Chenoweth, Michaela Buckle stuck to her story of not being there and knowing nothing, whilst Tayla Hegyesi was not able to be moved from her convincing testimony in support. Particular thanks go to Philippa Long and Susan Threlfall (our Team Coaches) from the Office of Public Prosecutions Geelong who provided sound guidance to our team.

The magistrate praised the Clonard team for their obvious preparation and superior presentation, with Clonard's team winning convincingly over Kardinia College (the prosecution). The next round, in which Clonard will be asked to prosecute a case, is on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> September (5.00pm to 6.15pm) – supporters most welcome!

## "A Son's Tour for Don"

On September 26, 13 year old St Joseph College student Rylan Bird will ride 1000 km's from Sydney to Geelong, along with his grandfather Ray McNamara, to raise money for his Dad, Don.

Rylan is riding to raise funds for special medical treatment for his Dad that is not available in Australia. The operation includes travelling to the US for an expensive transplant to restore normal use of his diaphragm and they are seeking to raise around \$100,000 by October. At this stage they have raised just over \$50,000.

On The 2<sup>nd</sup> of September four local Catholic secondary schools are coming together for a celebration called Triumphest (approx 5000 students). We feel that this would provide an excellent opportunity for Rylan to promote and gain support for his ride through his school community.

Rylan will be running a stall which will include the raffling of items kindly donated by Hendry Cycles, De Grandi Cycle and Sport, and Campione Cycles.

## Limited Time Left for Year 8's to Access Cervical Cancer Vaccine for Free

There are only four months to go for girls in Year 8 to finish their HPV immunisation course free of charge. Once the school year is over, any missed dose of the cervical cancer vaccine will need to be purchased from a GP or other health service provider at a cost of approximately \$150 each.

The HPV - or human papillomavirus - vaccine has been provided to girls in Year 7 since 2007 as part of the National Immunisation Program. To get free immunisation in Victoria, girls must commence the course in Year 7 and complete all doses by the end of Year 8. After that time, any missed dose must be paid for.

Ideally all three doses will be given within a 6 month period - 0, 2 and 6 months – however research shows if the second and third doses are given later than planned, the body still responds to the vaccine and makes antibodies which protect against HPV infection. This means it is still beneficial to complete the full three-dose course of the vaccine, even if doses aren't received at the correct intervals.

The HPV vaccine protects against four types of HPV which cause around 70 per cent of cervical cancers. It is important for all girls to complete the full course to ensure the best possible protection against the disease and other HPV-related illnesses.

If your daughter has still not completed the HPV vaccine course, please contact your local health provider as soon as possible. Missed doses can be obtained through public council immunisation sessions and your local GP.

Girls in Year 7 will receive their third and final dosage of the vaccine at school on 27<sup>th</sup> October.

If you are unsure of your daughter's immunisation record, contact your local council (Year 7 students) or the National HPV Vaccination Program Register (Year 8 students) on 1800 478 734.

#### After school hours Certificate II in Hospitality (Coffee, Bar & Waiter) course

Hospitality Training Australia is offering current and past Clonard College students & their families the opportunity to complete this Certificate 2 commencing shortly (dates tbc). Delivery of the course will be over three months - one evening per week from 3.30pm to 6.30pm and alternating Saturdays. Other selected days (9am to 2pm) would be possible over the term 3 holidays, and the balance, if necessary, in December. A Certificate 2 course requires 20 days delivery.

The HTA admissions department would complete all the course administration and supply all resources and equipment to facilitate the program. The total cost for this course is \$105 per person & includes training in Responsible Service of Alcohol, Responsible Service of Gaming, Responsible Service of Food, Health, Safety & Hygiene procedures, applying First Aid, etc. The course also provides individual assistance in resume development and work placement/post training support.
